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# 1. Girls from Oz - Melbourne Visit

On Sunday August 29, the day after the successful Halls Creek Music Festival, 12 girls from Halls Creek District High School departed sunny Halls Creek for chilly Melbourne.

The girls were accompanied by three staff members from the school and two from the Shire's Youth Services including Jaydene Long, who is undertaking a traineeship with the Australian School of Performing Arts. The excursion was an extension of the Girls from Oz activities taking place in Halls Creek throughout 2010.



The aim of the Girls from Oz project is to engage Indigenous girls and young women in Halls Creek – both within and outside of school – by using an innovative performing arts education program to create education, training and employment pathways. Girls from Oz utilises the 25 years of expertise and experience of the Australian School of Performing Arts (ASPA) team to deliver performing arts workshops encompassing song, dance, drama, language and storytelling.



Kylie Lee-Archer, Vice-Chair of the Girls from Oz said "The girls, ranging in age from 12 to 15, flew into Melbourne for an exciting week of activities including visits to the Melbourne Zoo, Scienceworks and the National Sports Museum at the MCG. A highlight of the week was shopping at the Melbourne Markets and along Bridge Road! The number of people and amount of traffic on Melbourne's streets, as well as Melbourne's famous trams, were a sight to behold for the girls at the beginning of the week, but in only a short time they became seasoned travellers.

The girls were hosted by Australian Girls' Choir families. While many identified differences in lifestyle, between the remote East Kimberley community and the suburbs of Melbourne, it was also clear that connections were formed easily and many common interests shared.



As well as playing tourist, the girls participated in a rehearsal with members of the Australian Girls' Choir, attended the choir's Gala Spring Concert and even did some performing of their own.

The Governor General – who visited the girls in Halls Creek in May – said she was thrilled to be able to invite the girls to a morning tea. The girls could hardly believe their luck at being able to meet with Her Excellency Ms Bryce for the second time in just three short months and performed three songs from their growing repertoire for Ms Bryce and her quests."



Kylie said that when the girls return to Halls Creek in the first week of November they will work towards their goal of being one of the small group chosen to travel to Sydney for activities towards the end of the school year.

Halls Creek Better Life Project (BLP) aims to improve services to the people of Halls Creek. The WA State Government (through the Department of Housing) funds the project however the BLP itself is not a government agency, NGO, Aboriginal organisation or private enterprise. The BLP facilitates community outreach, cross community engagement, communication and cooperation. The BLP coordinates interagency and community meetings and works closely with the Shire of Halls Creek and Wunan Foundation Inc. The BLP initiates projects and programs with local people, for local people, focusing on tangible outcomes of benefit to the whole community.

Their latest project is facilitating Certificate II Agriculture (Beef Production), with 10 participants, which is an accredited TAFE course, being held out at Burks Park.

## 3. Cape York Tour 2010

# A first step towards a united Aboriginal leadership for change in the East Kimberley.

Resultant of the establishment of the Jawun strategy in the East Kimberley (April 2010), the Cape York Institute invited Ian Trust (Wunan Foundation Inc) to facilitate a group of East Kimberley Leaders to visit Cape York between 6 – 11 September as a way of sharing ideas and building on existing relationships.

Virginia O'Neil, Robyn Long, Bonnie Edwards, Rose Stretch and Rikeisha Rivers are 5 women from Halls Creek who accompanied Ian Trust on this trip.

The tour was an opportunity to bring together, through shared experience, a diverse mix of people and interests from across the East Kimberley with the purpose of creating new ideas, confidence, and relationships that assist participants with their work in our region. Jawun have committed four secondees per year to support this agenda, with the possibility of longer term secondments.

The Cape York Tour seeks to achieve three important objectives for the East Kimberley:

- Build shared understanding and relationships across a diverse group of East Kimberley leaders.
- Start to develop priorities to guide the work of the Jawun strategy in the East Kimberley.
- Consider how East Kimberley leaders can support each other to make change in our communities.

# 4. Kimberley Dental Team Visit Halls Creek

The Kimberley Dental Team returned to Halls Creek and communities in August 2010 and provided 3 weeks of dental care and dental health education. As well as treating people at the hospital dental clinic, members of the team travelled by helicopter to Balgo (twice), Ringers Soak, Yiyili, Warmun, Crocodile Hole and back across the Leopold Ranges to Gibb River community. At the invitation of the communities KDT coordinators John and Jan Owen had spent 1 ½ days at Kalumburu and 1 day at Gibb River setting up the dental clinic and providing dental treatment before flying on to Halls Creek to meet the volunteer team travelling down from Kununurra.

In all 408 people were treated during this August trip and many children were screened. This brings the total number of people screened or treated by KDT to over 1,200. Many of these people have suffered years of severe and chronic dental disease that compromises their general health. It is often overlooked that a simple regime of regular and careful brushing of the teeth and gums prevents dental decay and gum disease (bleeding gums and slack teeth) from progressing. KDT has distributed in excess of 2,500 toothbrush and paste packs in the Kimberley to encourage better dental hygiene.

A return trip is planned for May 2011.

11 women from Halls Creek joined with 600 Indigenous women from around the world to attend the 9th World Indigenous Women & Wellness Conference held in Darwin at the Convention Centre in late August 2010.


Bonnie Edwards (pictured left) was one of the attendees and returned to Halls Creek with mixed emotions regarding the conference.

"It was great to be there, share the cultures of all the different nations and to meet other Indigenous women from around the world. I felt we talked about problems but not about any solutions. It would have been better to break into groups and workshop solutions to problems so we could return to Halls Creek with some new ideas" said Bonnie.

The Larrakia Nation Aboriginal Corporation (LNAC) have a deep commitment to evidence-based best practice, generating new knowledge and facilitating intellectual dialogue for the express purpose of improving the life quality of the Larrakia and Indigenous peoples from other nations. To advance these commitments, LNAC undertake research and deliver a series of programs. Their work has been acknowledged locally, across the Northern Territory and at both a national and international level. In October/November 2008 LNAC's important work was presented at the prestigious 8th World Indigenous Women and Wellness Conference held in Calgary, Canada. It was a great honour for the work of LNAC to be presented and acknowledged at this significant event.

With the support of an Australian delegation and the Board of Directors of the LNAC, Larrakia woman Tanya Williams put in a successful bid to host the 9th biannual conference.

At a ceremony in Calgary, Tanya was entrusted with a sacred object to bring back to Larrakia country. Tanya returned to Australia and buried the sacred object straight away with her cousin Dorrie-Anne Raymond. The sacred object was buried under a milk wood tree on Larrakia land. Following tradition, this sacred object will be passed to the next hosts of 10th World Indigenous Women and Wellness Conference. LNAC recognises her as an ambassador of the Larrakia people.
